1 A REQUEST IS MADE

2 THE SCHOOL COORDINATES SCHEDULING

The school or district works with Prevent Child Abuse Utah to schedule presentations.



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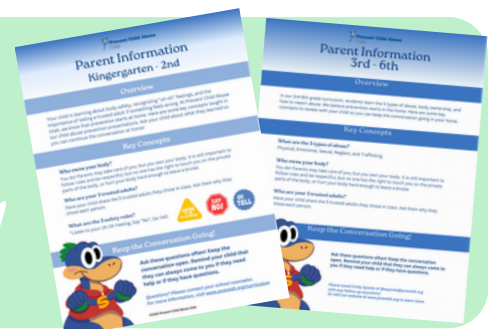
3 STUDENTS RECEIVE INSTRUCTION

Students participate in age-appropriate classroom presentations.



4 PARENTS REINFORCE LEARNING AT HOME

Families continue the conversation using shared language and safety rules.



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ASSUMPTIONS

▶ “My child would tell me if something was wrong.”

▶ “This doesn’t happen in my community.”

▶ “My child is too young for this conversation.”

▶ “This is too big of a problem and won’t be solved through the school system.”

REALITY

▶ **Children don’t know what abuse is or have the language to be able to tell what is happening.**

▶ **1 in 7 Utah children are abused regardless of where they live.**

▶ **Children are never too young to be safe and the presentations are age-appropriate.**

▶ **Child abuse isn’t inevitable, it is preventable! Prevention education cuts the risk of abuse in half.**
